What a busy year it has been with interesting talks, two walks in the village, visits to the dig which took place at Court Lodge Farm in August and a visit to the New Kent History and Library Centre in Maidstone.

Members of the committee have been working very hard on sorting out photographs, postcards and lots of other items which have either been donated or lent to the Society; a workshop evening also took place on 28th January when 25 members spent the evening sorting through and discussing these. The committee will be continuing with this work over the next few months with The Friends of St. John's with a view to putting together a book of Harrietsham in Old Photographs; it is hoped this will be available to be purchased in the autumn. Any help which members are able to give with this project will be appreciated.

Our next meeting will be our AGM on Monday 15th April at 7.30pm at Harrietsham School when we hope to hold another workshop evening after the formal business is finished. Unfortunately the society is without a Treasurer and is also one committee member short; hopefully we will be able to fill both these positions at the AGM, please let me know if you are interested. Membership fees for the new year will be taken on the evening.

Work is still progressing with the setting up of our website which we anticipate will be up and running by the end of April.

Harrietsham Gardening Society

The Society meeting on 19th February was well attended by 52 members (which included 4 new members) and 1 visitor. The Chairman, David Oversby, welcomed everyone and reminded them of the need to renew their memberships if they had not already done so. He commented on how changeable the weather had been which had varied from very cold and wet to almost spring-like over the past few weeks; he warned that people should avoid the temptation of buying and planting out the tender plants which were now flooding into the garden centres as undoubtedly we were still likely to experience some very cold frosty nights. The Chairman then introduced Mr Malcolm Withnall who gave a talk on "Growing Vegetables for the Table"; he started off by emphasising the chairman's comments on not planting things out at the present time as the ground was far too cold - this should be at a minimum temperature of 8° C. Amongst the many things Malcolm included were the importance of carrying out a soil test, improving the organic content and using the correct fertilisers depending on the types of vegetables you want to grow. He also mentioned the importance of buying good seeds (F1 Hybrid seeds produce the best results) and not keeping seeds from one year to the next unless they have been properly stored in a refrigerator at the correct temperature (5° C). He also suggested members consider the use of raised beds for their vegetable gardens as these are easy to look after as they take away the need to actually walk on the soil when digging them over. He mentioned crop rotation, planting in modules, the use of drip feed water systems and fleece for covering up and protecting vulnerable plants. Malcolm then answered a few questions from members before being thanked by Kevin Harlock for a most interesting talk.

The evening's competition for a Vegetable Animal was judged by the speaker, who awarded first place to Veronica Bastone for her Aubergine Penguin (12 points), second to John Welchman for his Pokémon (10 points) *Cont. overleaf*

and third to Sheila Mann for her Cucumber Shark (8 points), other members who entered were awarded 4 points each. The evening concluded with Stephen Morris advising members of various new products on the market this year.

The next meeting of the Society is on Tuesday 16th April at 7.30 pm when Mr Bob Ogley will be giving a talk entitled "Weather in Kent"; the competition for this evening is 3 Homemade Sweet Biscuits. Gardening Tips for April

At the time of writing this article we are just bracing ourselves for another helping of snow, but in April, with the improving weather, it will be all go in the garden. We have finished all the clearing up and are now busy planting all the new plants either grown from seed, or selected from the 1000s now in stock at the local garden centre. Don't rush to plant out those tender summer bedding or vegetable plants as the weather can still be unpredictable. Many plants will be forced along in time for the early Easter selling period.

Slugs will already be around, keep an eye out for emerging perennials as they like the nice new tender shoots. Protect with crushed shell or potting grit or use one of the chemical treatments, some child/wildlife friendly options are available including some made out of wool. Don't forget to stake perennials before they get too big.

Vegetable seeds and plants are still popular and space is no excuse. Many can be grown in containers, but don't get too ambitious. Just plant enough that you can cope with as there is nothing worse than throwing away vegetables that have gone over the top, "little and often" is the message.

You can start working on the lawns, by giving them a weed and feed, to get them going. Overseed any bare areas and give them a light roll before the surface dries out too much.

Harrietsham Network Some Easter Customs

How much do you know about Easter? There are many ancient and religious connotations to the festival, uniting the theme of 'renewal', in different ways. What strikes me as important, is the fact that all our belief systems interlink with each other, uniting people across the ages.

Admittedly, my memories of Easter lie with eggs. Tiny foil-wrapped ones were hidden amongst the garden, more generous Cadbury's ones were displayed on our Easter lunch plates, not to forget the personalised caverns arrayed for eager young eyes to view, first thing on Easter morning. I hasten to add that it was always sunny, always bright and always hopeful. For many, Easter is MORE important than Christmas, if less widely celebrated. For, without Easter, there would be no Christian faith. Jesus Christ rose from the dead, commonly known as the 'Resurrection'. Thus, for Christians, Easter is a message of hope.

Easter week starts on Palm Sunday (the Sunday before Easter), where church goers often receive a small cross made of palms, symbolising Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. One very famous U.K. Easter tradition is the giving out of 'Maundy Money' by the Queen. Centuries ago it was tradition that the reigning King or Queen would wash the feet of a few poor people, the number of people being the same as the monarch's age. This was to remember that Jesus washed his disciples' feet before the Last Supper. Over the years the tradition has changed. Now the Queen, carrying a bouquet of sweet herbs, gives little purses of money to a few chosen men and women. The ceremony is held at Westminster Abbey, in London, every other year. In the years when it isn't held at Westminster Abbey, the Queen distributes the Maundy Money at different cathedrals in the country.

A lot of Churches hold special Good Friday services. Sometimes the congregation is led to the church by a person or group of people carrying a large wooden cross. This reminds them that Jesus died on a cross on Good Friday. Some believe that potatoes or parsley bring luck, if planted by a woman on Good Friday too

However, Pagan traditions reach far back into the chronicles of time. The goddess of spring, dawn and fertility was called 'Eostre'. People thought that the sun died in the winter and came back to life in the spring. Eggs, hares and rabbits have long been associated with fertility symbols. Eostra's consort was the Sun god; it is widely known that the first SUNday after the first full moon succeeding the vernal equinox was sacred to her. Since Easter also occurs in the early spring, people brought the beloved pagan symbols into the Christian celebration of Easter.

The first person in the UK to receive an official Easter Egg was Henry VIII. The Egg was sent by the Pope. Decorating Easter Eggs is a common tradition, particularly in the North of England, Scotland, the Isle of Man and Ireland. Decorated Eggs are sometimes called 'pace eggs' in these areas. The word 'pace' comes from the word 'pasche' meaning Passover. For Jews, it observes the story of the Exodus, in which the ancient Israelites were freed from slavery in Egypt. However, for Jews, and many other faiths, there is no Easter *per se*, as Jesus is not at the focus of their faith.

Yoga classes for April and May

Also within this period I am organising a 'Gong Bath' (no water or undressing required) on Sunday 28th April from 10 am. The cost for this is £7 and booking is essential. The Gongs bathe the human body in sound. It is like a very deep and lasting massage with sound. Due to the complexity and delicate nature of the tones, overtones and harmonics of the Gong's sound your superficial thoughts are quietened, and you easily reach a much deeper consciousness. The usual result of a Gong Bath is that the person being 'gonged' feels very calm, relaxed and de-stressed, and often goes into a state of meditation automatically, where healing can more readily occur. Some physical aches and pains might have disappeared, or may lessen or vanish subsequently as the sounds of the Gong continue to do their work long after the Gong Bath has finished. Harrietsham Network-Council corner

In last month's magazine I wrote about an issue in Lenham around the doctors' surgery, Community Centre and parking. I felt that the matter would impact on Harrietsham residents who inevitably visit the surgery or Community Centre. On Friday 1st March I had to take my son to the doctors. KCC had hired the Community Centre and parking was horrendous. 113 vehicles parked wherever they could, excluding those spaces designated to staff associated with the surgery. Cars parked on grass and along Groom Way and onto the Old Ashford road junction. Vehicles trying to enter Groom Way were met by vehicles trying to exit; cars reversing back onto Old Ashford Road were met by cars travelling along Old Ashford Road; cars exiting Groom Way experienced difficulties because the sight lines were compromised due to cars parking either side of this junction. In all it was a chaotic and dangerous situation. I am afraid we cannot change permissions granted, but there needs to be a look at alleviating this problem which I am afraid will only worsen as the development comes to fruition. I am concerned for the elderly and those with mobility issues in particular.

Ironically, a Harrietsham resident wrote to me as she saw me counting cars. She said "I found there were an enormous number of cars parked on one side all the way along the road leading up to the doctors which made it impossible to see if there was a car coming the other way, and if there had been, making it near impossible to pull over anywhere in order to pass each other. This number of parked cars is dangerous and made it very difficult to navigate along that road, and when I eventually reached the car park I found nowhere to park. Cars were doubled in some spaces and there was a white van parked in one of the disabled spaces (no obvious blue badge). My worry is that if the new development has to use the same road access or has insufficient parking spaces planned, the residents will have no option but to park in the doctors' car park or along the road leading to it making access to the doctors very difficult, in particular for those with small children, the elderly or disabled."

I hope that these matters can be resolved soon.



Harrietsham Network Avoid a DIY disaster in your home

As Spring approaches, many people start turning their thoughts towards home improvements and those little jobs that have been put off over the winter, but fire crews are urging residents to take sufficient safety steps to prevent their 'Do-it-Yourself' (DIY) efforts leading to disaster.

Some DIY activities can increase the risk of fire and injury in the home. These range from fires ignited by blow torches being used to strip paint, to fires caused by faulty electrical equipment which may have been stored in a damp garage or shed over the winter period.

Community Safety Manager, Stuart Skilton, said: "Whether it's improving the kitchen, fixing up the spare room, or simply cutting the grass, accidents can happen when safety advice is ignored. The message from Kent Fire and Rescue Service (KFRS) is therefore; if you are going to do it yourself – do it safely.

"People often make mistakes when they are either tired or trying to get jobs finished quickly. Always ensure that the task is within your capabilities and that you take professional advice when required."

He added: "If you are carrying out DIY, this is an ideal time to fit a smoke alarm in your property. Just three breaths of fire smoke can prove fatal, making a smoke alarm an essential safety feature in your home. If you already have a smoke alarm, ensure it is clear from dust and that the batteries are working."

To help avoid a DIY disaster always:

- Check you have the correct tools for the job
- Keep children and pets safe and remove any obstructions from your workplace
- When checking or repairing electrical tools always turn them off at the mains
- Flammable liquids should be used in accordance with manufacturer's instructions
- Before attempting to drill holes, check for electrical wiring running behind walls
- Fit smoke alarms on each level of your home and test them weekly
