Network - Harrietsham's Village Magazine January 1970 – April 2022

In January 1970 the members of the Fish Scheme produced the first copy of the Network. This was a simple A5 leaflet with 10 pages and a fishing net design on the front cover. The magazine was edited by Douglas Baldwin, assisted by the editorial board comprising of Ian Mckenzie, Rev R. Maxwell and Mrs Baldwin. The printing costs for the magazine were paid by the advertising and donations from Fish Scheme supporters. A copy of this issue can be viewed on the Archive page on our website www.harrietshamfishscheme.org.

Douglas Baldwin continued as editor until September 1972 when he handed over to Ian Mckenzie who edited just two issues before Bill Green became editor in November 1972 and produced the next fifty six editions finishing in June 1977, by which time the magazine had increased to an average of 20 pages each month. In July 1977 David Ellis took over as editor and continued until February 1981 when Ian Mckenzie stepped in once again and took over editing for the next ninety four months ending in December 1988.

Since Network was first published the editors have been from a number of different walks of life, it has had an auditor, a patent agent, a dentist and a land agent. After nineteen years it now had the logical luxury of a journalist as Andrew Bond took over the role in January 1989 and stayed until February 1994.

November 1992 saw the change in design of the front cover which stayed with the magazine until December 2011. After Andrew retired as editor Ken & Pam Hounsom took over in March 1994 and became the longest serving editors of the magazine producing one hundred and eleven issues which ended in May 2003. During the time they were editors the magazine increased to thirty six pages with considerably more news from the village organisations and additional adverts to pay for the extra printing costs. The next five issues, June 2003 to October 2003 were edited by Chris and Hazel Roots before Pamela Cuerden became editor in November 2003 and continued to produce the magazine until November 2011 when this was taken on by Rosi Taylor until August 2015.

January 2012 saw the production of the first digital copies of the Magazine with the latest front cover and colour advert pages and a few colour pages and photos. Copies of the magazine were also available to view and to download on our website.

In September 2015 Ann Brown became editor and produced the magazine until July 2018 when unfortunately she suffered a brain haemorrhage and was unable to continue. The next seven issues of the magazine were edited by Anthony Wiffen and Rod Martenstyn, with Anthony dealing with the August, October and November 2018 and the February 2019 issues and Rod doing the September and December 2018 and the January 2019 issues. Rod Martenstyn has been a member of the editorial team for a number of years, stepping in on occasions to help out.


In April 2019 our current editor Jan Dijkstra-Caplan edited her first copy of the magazine and sadly is finishing by editing the final copy this month April 2022. Jan has probably had to cope with one of the most difficult periods experienced in the life of the magazine with the arrival of the Covid Virus in early 2020, but with the assistance of the current editorial team Amanda Ward, Denise Williams and Rod Martenstyn has managed to produce a copy every month over the past two years despite the lack of activities in the village.

Over the past fifty two years there have been a number of advertising managers, all of these have worked extremely hard obtaining advertisers to provide an income to enable the Fish Scheme to publish and distribute the Network magazine free to all residents. There have also been a large number of volunteers delivering the magazine every month, currently organised by Jackie Bevan and David Lowry. Sadly the time has come to put the Network to bed for the last time as unfortunately despite our considerable efforts we have been unable to find anyone to help us continue its production.

A FISHY BUSINESS

Some people may think there is something fishy about this new magazine delivered free. You don't often get something for nothing these days. Where's the catch? There isn't one. Advertisers to whom we are most arateful - knowing this publication will reach every home have put up enough money to pay for the printing. So do support them and quote this magazine when you do so. The only fishy thing about it, is that Network has been started by the Fish Scheme - your neighbours who have offered to have a share in an Emergency Help plan. We've called our magazine "Network" because of the Fishy association but mainly because it speaks of communication - people at the top of Stede Hill for example being kept in touch with those who live Fairbourne way, people in the Tennis Club knowing about the latest activities of the Darby and Joan Club and so on. We seek to serve people of differing views and beliefs and therefore Network is non-party and ecumenical. Partisan and controversial issues can be aired but the editorial staff will try to express a fair balance. So do let us have your comments and suggestions; (we have much to learn), and do keep us supplied with news of club and other village activities. This must reach the editor (Douglas Baldwin of 15 West Street) by the 15th of the month.

Terry Hodges (4 Rectory Lane) has offered to help net our news. Ian Mackenzie has already netted the advertisers and Mrs. Jackie Brasington and Miss Norah Cutbush hope to net everyone in their distribution plan. We are most grateful to all who are helping in this way. The writer of these remarks as editor of this magazine's ageing parent (now deceased) will serve as Consultant and is responsible for the Christian Message which each issue will contain. These will be written by local Christian leaders of

Harrietsham Network Borough Council Corner

We write this with the dreadful war in Ukraine in the forefront of our thoughts and the terrible suffering of so many innocents. The people will need help in so many ways. The Red Cross, UNICEF, Médicins Sans Frontieres/Doctors Without Borders amongst others will of course be very grateful for your donations. We are so lucky to have the basics that we sometimes times take for granted.

20's Plenty Residents may remember that over 8 years ago we collected more than a 1000 names on a petition locally, calling for 20mph outside our schools. This was adopted by Maidstone Borough Council and working with KCC, pilot schemes were established in the Borough. At the February Full Council meeting we asked MBC to consider beginning a process to bring in 20mph as a default speed where needed in both town and village locations. Following amendment and discussion it was agreed by a significant number of enlightened councillors that where support from the community could be established the Borough council would support this where it could be agreed.

The Local Government Boundary Commission consultation regarding ward boundaries closes on **4 April**. It is very important as the suggestion is to have a new ward comprising of Harrietsham, Lenham and Hollingbourne as well as Otterden, Wichling, Wormshill, Frinsted , Hucking, Bicknor and Broad Street a ward 8 and half miles long covering 9 Parishes. Additionally, and particularly concerning, is the removal of Lenham Heath, Sandway and Platts Heath to Headcorn ward - all the area south of the railway line. We are shocked that there has been this suggestion that the Lenham Parish for Borough elections could be split like this. We oppose this attempt to adjust numbers at the residents' expense and we know that this will be opposed by others. With the Boundary commissions key aims being, electoral equality, community identity and effective and convenient local government, we feel that this proposal fails on all three points. 



Harrietsham Network Christian Message

As I write this is February. Storm Eunice is in full swing outside the window and Lenham has just lost internet, electric and telephone line

You will read this in April when we hope for clear skies, warmth, extreme growth in the gardens and hedgerows, baby birds, Easter eggs & bunnies, resurrection and summer within sight...

But right now a 'storm of a storm' rages across a bright sky with menacing fast scudding clouds.

Storms hit our lives in a myriad of forms. An accident, a sudden bereavement, redundancy, a relationship breakup, an angry encounter, a torrid discovery, an unexpected illness and so on.



Storms of life happen. They cause us anxiety; we cannot settle or focus. We may hide under the duvet enveloping the problem in excess sleep. Conversely, we may not sleep a wink as we relive the dilemma repeatedly. De- stabilised some seek the help of friends or family, or a counsellor; others run to remote places to try to figure it all out on their own. Sometimes we are dumbstruck and other times we need to talk endlessly about the problem. We respond according to our character and life experiences. Few of us show no signs of strain whatsoever in a storm of life. Even those highly trained to cope with trauma and calamity will likely experience post trauma effects, bodily or mentally.

But what if the Holy Spirit of Jesus was present with us as the trauma or storm erupted? How might His presence help?

Jesus is known for the calming of a storm on Lake Galilee on at least 2 occasions. Once asleep in the hull of the boat whilst the disciples grappled with the raging waves, unbothered, He is surprised when they wake Him asking for His help – he speaks to the storm and peace descends. On another occasion he walks across the water to Peter and friends in the boat equally showing His fearlessness in the face of the storm. The presence of Jesus changes storms. I will say that again: the presence of Jesus changes storms.

Those who watched Him die in a storm of political upheaval and religious betrayal then met Him in a resurrected state, alive, conquering and overcoming death and were changed forever for the experience of the first Easter as He breathed His Holy Spirit upon them and gave them His peace.... the very events from which the church is birthed.

Christian Message (cont'd)

It would be a lie to say that the presence of Jesus makes everything alright. We may still have to go through that surgery, divorce, redundancy, court case, bereavement. But with Christ - the anointed one - beside us we can know He will comfort, protect and guide us. His presence strengthens us to bear the storm, as we receive the Prince of Peace. The storms surrender to His authority and in His hands, they ease; we trust His wise accompaniment. For all wisdom's ways are perfect and all her paths are peace....Proverbs 3:17

Next time we hit a life-storm let us make sure, metaphorically, we have Jesus in our boat with us and with even a little faith we shall fare much better I am confident.
